Round, 30.5mm, plain edge, bronze, brilliant, unknown make, unknown mintage.

The first token or medal associated with the PCNS was issued to honor the Society's founder, Farran Zerbe. By 1930, Zerbe had relocated back to the east coast but returned in July of that year for a Founder's dinner in his honor. The initials H.L.H. and E.R.W. appear on the tokens. Harvey L. Hansen and Ernest R. Wernstrom were among the most active members of the society during the 1930s, and it is likely that they commissioned this issue. Found in both aluminum and bronze alloy, there are rumors of a fibre example. Any information regarding such specimens would be greatly appreciated by the Editor.
