### **1081<sup>st</sup> meeting. May 24, 2006: Denman Grammar School Medals**

*Michael Wehner*

Michael gave a presentation on the Denman School medals, academic and deportment awards to girls and young women who attended James Denman's grammar school in San Francisco from 1856 to the early part of the 1900s. Four types of medals were identified, one becoming known to Michael from the large collection which Jerry Schimmel brought. Debate centered around whether two of the types were awarded to Denman School graduates only or were awarded city-wide. Further research is underway.

### **Exhibits (May 2006).** (reported by *Herb Miles*)

*Federico Castiillo* brought some recent acquisitions, a book, "Necessity Coinage of Guatemala" and a nice commemorative medal.

*Lew Robinson* gave us a thorough explanation of gold dredging, a task he has done extensively and with some results as he brought a slew of gold nuggets to share with us, some in crystalline form! His description of the difficulty and hard work it takes to retrieve these miniscule pieces of gold gave us all pause!

*John Dale* brought two interesting items, one an encased Lincoln Cent from 1948 and another from the Daisy BB gun manufacturing company, a "Daisy Dollar."

*Mark Wm Clark* exhibited an Israeli Commemorative Set featuring some large silver pieces and a magnificent Mexican award from the "Order of International Law and Peace!"

*Gordon Donnell* showed off his sets of Afghanistani items won at an ANA convention, one set featuring coins and the other showing bank notes used in this country.

Visitor *Scott Annechino* exhibited a portion of his collection of coins from the Belgian Congo, a 5 Francs graded PCGS MS66, a 1743 Mexico City 8 Reales graded NGC MS63, and a New Jersey copper cent graded MS 61!

*Jerry Schimmel* exhibited his many examples of San Francisco school medals, in support of Michael's presentation; Jerry brought some Denman School medals, some from the Bridge school, and Lincoln School. Jerry added to Michael's presentation by exhibiting a distinct type of the Denman medal, one not seen before.

*Rick Webster* brought a nice array of British medals, a 25<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Victoria and Albert, a Science and Art Medal of 1897, a Maundy Set from 1900, a George V Coronation Medal, and a Prince Charles Medal, notable for the dragon pictured on the reverse.

*Ken Takahashi* took us on his latest tour through China, Korea and Japan, showing coins acquired at various locations during the cruise he took with his wife.

*Michael Wehner*, not to be satisfied with bringing his Denman School Medals, also brought a "Bay to Breakers" medal, probably an early version perhaps from the 1950s but not dated.

*Sandra Whalen* exhibited some nice silver Canadian coins that feature holograms of the Northern Lights and an Iceberg, the colors are wonderful and really do recall the Northern Lights, and the reflection from an iceberg!

*Whalen* brought some examples of how different mints package their products. Two United States 1955 Proof sets, one a flat pack and the other housed in individual cellophane envelopes, a British Proof set of 1955 in a brittle plastic container, a 1955 U.S. Mint set in cardboard and envelopes and a 1955 Canadian set, also housed in a brittle plastic material. It is interesting to see the differences in packaging and how they have protected (or didn't) the coins during the interim period and how the plastic and cellophane holders have lasted through the years.
