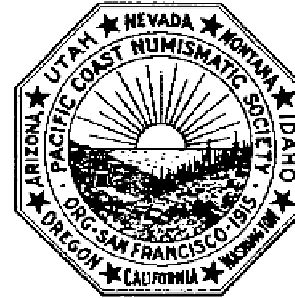

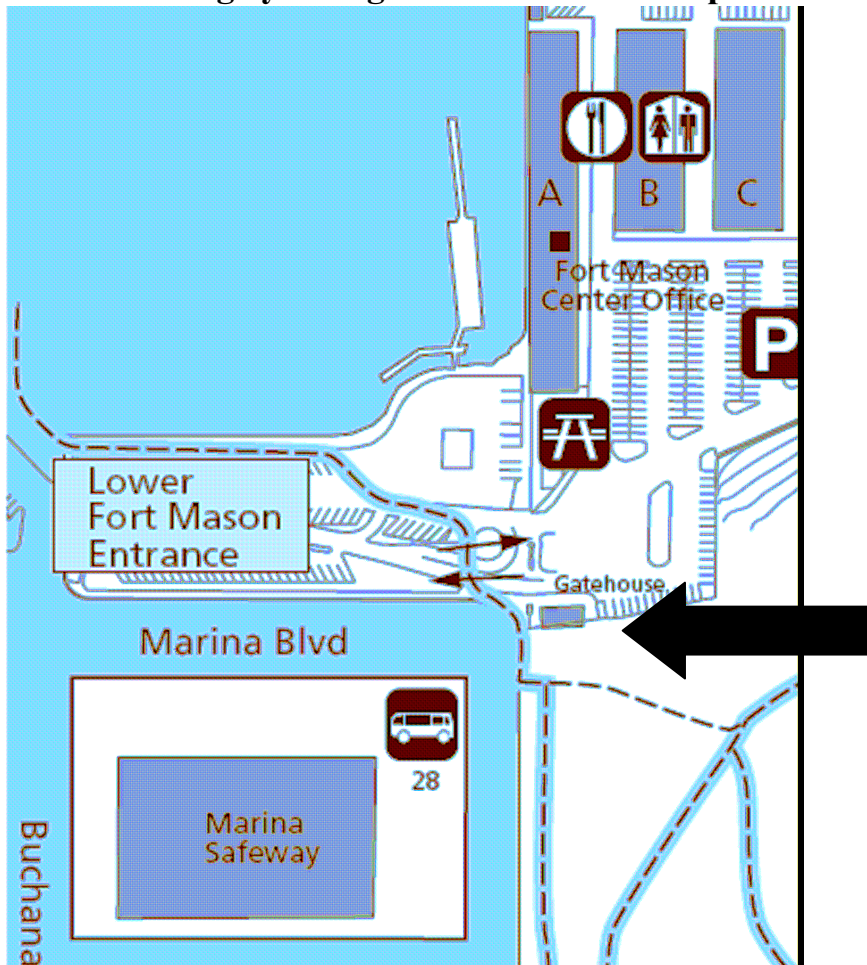

**1099<sup>th</sup> meeting, Turkey Coins** *Everyone!* (reported by Sandra Peters)

In what has become a Thanksgiving PCNS tradition, the November meeting was a chance for members to show interesting items from the collections in an extended format. The evening had a good share of “turkeys” and few “eagles” as well.

Jerry Schimmel gave us our "evening Chinese lesson." He had a large, gold colored chinese cash coin replica that represented the 50th anniversary of the Far East Cafe. Ken said the food there was edible but not outstanding. The cafe is at 631 Grant. He tried to find the opening date and decided it was either 1970 or 1981. He also had a Manhattan Savings Bank coin from the 1960's with a similar design. The chinese words on it that suggested it was auspicious for one's life and had been on a key chain.

Ken had a "coin with sizzle." It was an example of an Ecuadorian coin from "Moby Dick" that is mentioned in Chapter 99 when captain Ahab nails it to a mast. He says that whoever sees the white whale first gets the coin. Ken drew a diagram of the reverse of the coin that showed signs of the zodiac, with the sun crossing from virgo to libra which showed it to be from the autumnal equinox. The obverse was their "miss liberty."

Mark W. Clark had a coin with names of Algerian cities on it that he had gotten from a bag of coins someone gave him. It turned out to be a bangle made of brass for a belly dancer.

Scott Annechino showed 4 beautiful 8 and 4 reales coins from Mexico and Peru that were graded mint state by NGC.

At the other end of the turkey/eagle spectrum, Michael Wehner showed counterfeit Mexican coins from 1732 and 1733 and a genuine 8 reales salvaged from the sea. Ugly!
