The evening program consisted of an extended show and tell about the Panama Pacific International Exposition (see back cover for two items). For those new members not familiar with the organization's history, Stephen related the story of the donation of a large collection of memorabilia to PCNS and the efforts to catalog the collection. Much of it has been dispersed over the years to help fund the organization.

Whalen shared a variety of PPIE items including an Opening Day pin and some of the commemorative coins. He related the story of a Japanese model garden that survives today in the Saratoga Japanese Gardens.

Catz shared a 1960s reprint of a Bird's-Eye View poster of the exposition grounds.

Herb shared a variety of pieces including the naughty mating bear spinner. One photographic interpretation of the "Persistence of Memory" spinner is illustrated on the back cover of this bulletin.

Lew shared a small leather purse with a metal plate closure that included the legends and symbols of the PPIE.

David brought his collection of PPIE so-called dollars, and opening day pin, and an award medal.

Stephen, having regaled us all with tales of living with the large collection of PPIE souvenirs chose instead to share an electrotype shell of a medal from the exposition of MDCCCLXXVIII.

Bill also deviated from the theme and shared his collection of 1909 and 1913 Portola Festival medals.

1915 and the founding of the Pacific Coast Numismatic Society

(selections from *History of the Pacific Coast Numismatic Society
1915-1990 as Interpreted from the Meeting Minutes* by David W. Lange)

February 29, 1916: PCNS had 15 active members and 8 honorary members. (We have 34 active members, 2 distinguished members, 3 fellows, and 3 family members today.) Dues were raised to 10 cents per month!

The March 28, 1916 meeting featured an exhibit of Greek tetradrachms from the collection of A. Reimers and a complete set of tokens used at Sing Sing prison in New York.

In April, honorary membership was conferred on George H. Barron, the de Young museum curator and T. W. H. Shanahan, Superintendent of the San Francisco Mint.

Exhibits at the May meeting included a proof 1854 Kellogg gold coin and an uncirculated 1826 half eagle that sold for \$20 at the meeting!
