1154th meeting, June 30, 2012

1915 and the founding of the Pacific Coast Numismatic Society

(periodic selections from History of the Pacific Coast Numismatic Society 1915-1990 as Interpreted from the Meeting Minutes by David W. Lange)

August, 1916: The Society moved its meetings to the office of President Fred Huddart at the Board of Trade Building having outgrown their previous meeting place. Farran Zerbe read a paper rebutting the claim of the Society of California Pioneers that they owned an 1804 silver dollar that the U.S. Treasury was ready to buy for \$20,000. The PCNS secretary reported that he had been invited by the Chief Coiner at the Mint to view trial strikes of the new Winged Liberty dime.

October 1916: The Society held a banquet at the Union League Club honoring Farran Zerbe since his work with the PPIE coin program had concluded and he was preparing to move back to his home in Tyrone, Pennsylvania. President Huddart exhibited the coin collection of the Society of California Pioneers which he had recently purchased. It had been displayed at the Mint for the past 40 years and yes, the 1804 silver dollar proved to have an altered date.

Over the next year, attendance began to decline to around 8 or 9 members with few bringing exhibits to share. Basil Brandon continued the tradition with frequent exhibits of British coins.
